American police are investigating
a series of suspicious incidents
involving animals at a zoo in
Dallas, Texas.

The latest mystery saw the disap-
pearance of a pair of emperor tamar-
in monkeys, which zoo keepers said
would normally stay close to home.

They were eventually found in an
abandoned house 15 miles away and
returned safely to the zoo.

A zoo spokesman said: "We are
thrilled beyond belief to share that our
two emperor tamarin monkeys have
been found."

In the first incident at the zoo during
January, a clouded leopard escaped
from its enclosure through a hole that
had been cut in fencing. The young
creature was soon found safe and well.

Another hole was cut in the fencing
of an enclosure for langur monkeys,
but none had escaped.

Fact SHED

■ Emperor tamarin monkeys are
native to the Amazon and are
known for their distinctive whiskers.

■ They only grow to around 9-10in
(23-26cm) although their tail can be
almost twice that length. They only
weigh around 18 ounces (500g).

Worst of all, a lappet-faced vulture
was found dead at the zoo with what
was described as an unusual wound.
The 35-year-old bird, known as Pin,
was one of only 6,500 lappet-faced
vultures left in the world.

Police are trying to identify a man
seen wandering around the zoo before
the incidents and zoo officials have
now installed more security cameras
and increased patrols.
