Lent is an important time of reflection for many Christians. It lasts for 40 days, excluding Sundays. According to the Bible, this represents the length of time that Jesus spent in the desert fasting and being tempted by the devil. In the past, many Christians would **fast** throughout Lent to reflect on Jesus' life and they would exclude rich foods from their diet, such as meat, eggs and butter.

Nowadays, many Christians may choose to give up a luxury item like chocolate instead.

Lent is always in spring but the exact date varies each year. Traditionally, the day before Lent was a time for feasting and pancakes would often be served to use up food.

Ash Wednesday

For many Christians, Ash Wednesday is the first day of Lent and it is a time for forgiveness. Many Christians celebrate this day by attending a church service where ashes are blessed and then a cross-shaped mark is applied to worshippers' foreheads.

Palm Sunday

Palm Sunday is the beginning of Holy Week, which is the last week of Lent. According to the Bible, this is when Jesus arrived in Jerusalem riding on a donkey. The crowd welcomed him by waving palm leaves and laying their cloaks on the path where he rode. Some churches give out small crosses made from palm leaves to remember this day.

Maundy Thursday

On Maundy Thursday, Christians remember when Jesus and his disciples shared their final meal together, known as the Last Supper. During this meal, Jesus washed the feet of his disciples. Christians believe that Jesus was teaching his friends how to respect and love one another. They shared bread and wine and Jesus told his disciples to do this to remember him after his death. Later that night, Jesus was betrayed by one of his disciples, Judas.



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Good Friday

On Good Friday, Christians believe that Jesus died and gave up his life for others. Roman soldiers nailed him to a cross after he had carried it for a long distance. Some Christians avoid eating meat on this day.

Easter Sunday

Easter Sunday is considered to be the most important event in the Christian calendar. It is when Christians celebrate the **resurrection** of Jesus. The Bible says that Jesus' body was placed in a tomb after his death. This was guarded by soldiers and its entrance was covered by a heavy stone. When one of Jesus' followers visited the tomb, she found that the stone had been moved and his body had disappeared. According to the Bible, Jesus was seen later that day and several times afterwards.

Easter Sunday marks the end of Lent and church services are held to celebrate the day. Christians consider Easter Sunday to be a joyful occasion because it represents the promise of eternal life in heaven. Traditionally, people would end their fasting and Easter eggs are often shared to symbolise new life.

In the past, many Christians would fast throughout Lent to reflect on Jesus' life and they would exclude rich foods from their diet, such as meat, fish, eggs and butter. Nowadays, while some Christians may continue to follow this practice, many Christians may choose to give up a luxury item (such as chocolate) or an activity (such as spending time on social media).

Traditionally, the day before Lent is a time for feasting and pancakes would often be served to use up any indulgent foods. In the UK, this day is known as Shrove Tuesday; the word 'shrove' is derived from the word 'shrive' which means to forgive.

Lent is always in spring but the exact date varies each year. Western and Eastern Churches' calendars are slightly different; therefore, different denominations of Christianity may celebrate Easter on different dates.

Ash Wednesday

In most churches, Lent commences on Ash Wednesday. Ash Wednesday is a time for forgiveness; many Christians celebrate this day by attending a church service. Ashes are blessed and a cross-shaped mark is then applied to the forehead of each worshipper.



Palm Sunday

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Palm Sunday is celebrated one week before Easter Sunday and it marks the beginning of Holy Week (the last week of Lent). According to the Bible, this is when Jesus, whom Christians believe to be the son of God, entered Jerusalem riding on a donkey. The crowd welcomed his arrival by waving palm leaves and laying their cloaks on the path where he rode. In remembrance of this day, some churches give out small crosses made from palm leaves. In many Roman Catholic churches, the leftover palm leaves are subsequently burnt to obtain ashes; these are used during the following year's Ash Wednesday service.



Maundy Thursday

On Maundy Thursday, Christians commemorate when Jesus and his disciples shared their final meal together - the Last Supper. During this meal, Jesus washed the feet of his disciples, which was normally a job reserved for servants. Christians believe that this act was Jesus teaching his friends humility. As they dined together, they shared bread and wine and Jesus instructed his disciples to do this to remember him after his death. Later that night, Jesus was betrayed by one of his disciples, Judas. In churches across the world, there are Eucharist services where the congregation share bread and wine to remember Jesus' last meal with his disciples.

Good Friday

On Good Friday, according to the Bible, Roman soldiers forced Jesus to carry a cross to Golgotha, where he was later crucified (nailed to the cross). Christians believe that Jesus sacrificed his life for others and atoned people's sins. Around the world, Good Friday is often seen as a solemn day and Christians celebrate this differently: some people avoid eating meat and some churches will avoid using the organ during the service.

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Easter Sunday is considered to be the most important event in the Christian calendar; it is when Christians celebrate their belief that Jesus was resurrected (raised back to life after death). The Bible says that, after Jesus was crucified, his body was placed in a tomb that was guarded by soldiers and its entrance was covered by a large, heavy stone. Traditionally, people would end their fasting and a large feast of meat, eggs and cheeses would be served. Easter eggs are often gifted to symbolise the concept of new life and, irrespective of religion, many people who are not Christian also choose to observe this tradition.

Pupils' own responses, such as: I think that eggs are a good symbol of new life because eggs are what some animals, like birds, hatch from. I think an egg is also a similar shape to a large stone, which may remind Christians of Jesus' tomb.
