Dear Parents / Carers,

I hope you have all had a lovely weekend. We have a busy week in school this week - tomorrow we have a Music for Life concert and our High 5 netball team are going to Outwood Ripon to take part in a festival - good luck! On Wednesday Year 3 and 4 have their Stone Age workshop.

Fiji Day – Thursday

On Thursday we will be celebrating Fiji Day. A huge thank you to members of the Fijian community who are coming to school to share the history of Fiji with the children and the staff.

Class News:

Every week the classes will share the highlights of what they have been learning about with our families:

EYFS: This week we have made some lovely invitations in the same style as 'Sharon Pierce'. The children drew continuous lines for balloon strings and painted ovals using fine paint brushes. The children have also been busy making sandwiches for baby bears birthday party following step by step instructions.

Year 1 and 2: Year 1 and 2 have had a fantastic week - we have been learning to write noun phrases using adjectives and nouns in preparation to write our poems. We have been learning to count in 2, 5, and 10s in maths and find the missing numbers on a number line. In DT this week we used templates to trace around and then cut out the fabric pieces - its sounds a lot easier that it was! In Art we have completed some observational drawing of flowers. We have had fun in PE using our football skills to aim and strike the ball into a goal.



Year 3 and 4: This week we have started out new whole class reading book, 'The Lion, the witch and the wardrobe' and we have been busy exploring some of the characters within the story so far. In Geography, we have been using our map skills to locate different urban areas in the UK and found it really interesting to identify the origins of some of these settlements. We have been developing our pencils skills in art by exploring how we can use pencils in different ways to create different textures and tones and we look forward to putting this learning to work next week when we start some observational drawings.

Year 5 and 6: This week we have been learning about the different types of desert biomes. The children have researched, using secondary sources, two of the types of deserts that are found in the world. The children are going to present their findings to their group next lesson. The children have been doing really well with the clarinet. The year 5s are making an excellent start with learning the notes and year 6s are playing some songs reading the music as they go!

Product safety alert – water beads - message from North Yorkshire Council

OPSS has issued a safety alert for a product commonly known as 'water beads (https://www.gov.uk/product-safety-alerts-reports-recalls/product-safety-alert-water-beads-psa7), alongside a news story (https://www.gov.uk/government/news/opss-issues-safety-alert-to-warn-ofthe-risks-of-water-beads).

Water beads are marketed to fulfil a variety of different purposes, which can include being used as a toy, or in crafting, home decor and floristry.

The alert highlights the harms caused by the dehydrated bead/s when swallowed that can expand post-ingestion, causing a blockage along the gastrointestinal (GI) digestive tract requiring surgical removal. Additionally, a hydrated or dehydrated bead can cause asphyxiation from aspiration if swallowed. Ingested water beads can be very difficult to detect and do not show up on x-ray, making clinical diagnosis challenging.











They are also looking into the issue of 'baby personal protective equipment (PPE)' type products. For example, there are products for sale that are being marketed for use by babies and toddlers and claim to offer head protection in the event of a fall, such as:

Baby Head Protection Pillow – Thebossbaby

BabySafe - Head Protector - TinyWonders

JINYJIA Baby Head Protector, Baby Head Protector Backpack, Adjustable Toddler Head Protection Safety Pads, for 4-24 Months Baby Learning Walking, Honeybee : Amazon.co.uk: Home & Kitchen

Concerns have been raised that potentially the design and construction of this type of product presents an intolerable risk of harm to babies and young toddlers and they are gathering evidence around the risks. If you or colleagues are aware of any incidents/incident data relating to this product type, anything you share will be hugely appreciated and can only increase the robustness of the evidence base. Weekly Attendance

Good attendance at school is key to your child's progress.

Good attendance is essential for pupils to get the most out of their school experience, including their attainment, wellbeing, and wider life chances. Nationwide research has shown that the pupils with the highest attainment at the end of key stage 2 have had higher rates of attendance throughout primary school, compared to those with the lowest attainment. The government aims for all pupils to have a minimum of 96% attendance across the school year, and any child with less than 90% attendance is recorded as a persistent absentee.
